## Welcome from our Chief Executive – Catherine Burn



Hello, and thank you for taking the time to read this edition of our magazine.

I'm Catherine Burn, and I joined
St Mary's as Chief Executive in October
2024. As I approach the end of my first
year in post, I've been reflecting on
what an incredible and rewarding time
it's been so far. St Mary's is a place full
of heart, passion, and purpose—and it's
been a privilege to begin getting to
know the people who make it what it is.

I've spent most of my career in the charity sector, and I've always been driven by a deep commitment to community. Before coming to St Mary's, I was CEO at Carlisle Mencap, a social care provider in the north of Cumbria, where I learned a great deal about resilience, local partnerships, and the everyday impact of compassionate care.

Originally from Nottinghamshire, I moved into the voluntary sector in 2008 after working in manufacturing in South Yorkshire. My first role was as a volunteer coordinator with Bassetlaw

CVS, where I later became CEO. That experience grounded me in the value of local infrastructure and taught me the importance of listening, collaboration, and long-term relationships—skills that continue to guide me today.

Over the years, I've worked closely with the NHS, chaired multi-agency partnerships, and served as a volunteer across a wide range of causes—from food banks and community centres to education and animal welfare. I currently volunteer at 4Eden an amazing charity supporting people with Learning Disabilities and Autism based in Penrith, and I'm proud to be a governor at Ullswater Community College.

Being awarded the British Empire Medal in 2020 for services to the community during the Covid-19 pandemic remains one of the proudest moments of my life—but it is in the everyday, often unseen work of local organisations like St Mary's where I believe the most meaningful change happens.

As I continue to settle into my role, I'm eager to listen, learn, and connect with as many of you as possible. My goal is to build on the incredible legacy of this organisation, ensuring we stay true to our values while embracing the opportunities ahead. I'm excited about what we can achieve together.

## Sarah's Story

Mine and my daughter's story is an extremely difficult one. My first daughter, Heather, sadly took her own life on the 30th of April 2022, at 22 years old.

Heather's sudden passing was of course a huge devastation to our family and Heathers' friends, and came as a massive shock. Leading up to Heather's funeral, a group chat was made, named TeamH's Angels. I wanted to do something to remember Heather by, which led to me and TeamH's Angels doing Walk to Remember in the following September 2022, raising nearly £2,500. We also did Walk to Remember the following years in 2023 and 2024.



I used to be a Brownie leader and Heather would help me, as well as helping at her old Rainbow unit. Heather and her sister, Emily, volunteered for girl guiding in Romania. This led to my girl guiding friends asking me if I would like to create something in memory of Heather and we created a mental wellbeing pack. To make this we spoke to MIND, Every Life Matters (a suicide support service), SAFA (a self-harm support group based in Barrow), and Papyrus (a charity for suicide prevention).

We gathered all this information and from this created a Brownie Badge called Twinkle for Heather, because Twinkle was Heather's leader name when she went to Rainbows. For this, we held a prelaunch in High Newton, where we invited many guides and leaders to come along and try out the activities inside the pack. BBC Breakfast even came to film us, which aired around 2 weeks later. I felt so lucky and overwhelmed with support. The official launch was held at Kendal College, where we held a pamper evening for all the guides and leaders who attended. We did this pamper evening in memory of Heather as she loved makeup and spending her time watching hair and makeup tutorials. We held this event intentionally on the 10th October (2023), on World Mental Health Awareness Day.

From this event, so much awareness was spread, gaining enquiries from around 40 different countries, selling over 4,000 badges. Leading us to hold more events to spread our message even further. We also went to John Ruskin Primary School and used the pack we created which includes the five steps to mental wellbeing. The last step is to 'learn something new' so we had five different zones, where we taught them drumming, archery, skipping, crafts, meditation and yoga. There was a turnout of 160 girls and I have had so much positive feedback since. We have another Pamper Night coming up at Barrow In Furness College.



Ultimately, we do Walk to Remember as a way for us all to remember Heather, together. It sounds clichéd, but suicide is a permanent solution to a temporary problem.

Each December, our Light Up A Life ceremonies offer a meaningful way to remember loved ones. Dedicate a light on our Christmas tree in honour of someone special — a symbol of love, hope, and remembrance. ## Jo's Journey to St Mary's Hospice

Care work isn't for everyone. And everyone isn't up to doing care work. Though sometimes, just maybe, life might throw you into a situation that proves you were meant to work in care after-all.

"He said to me, 'you've messed up, you should have been a nurse.'

"Even now, I can still hear him saying it and looking at me with that big smile," recalls Jo Firth, who took inspiration from the care her brother received during his final weeks of life, at the Hospice.

Richard — or Fud as he was affectionately known in the local music scene and to his friends and family — spent his final weeks at St Mary's. It was a painful time for everyone — but one which would change things for Jo forever.

"Nursing wasn't something I'd ever really thought about to be honest, in fact when I first came into the Hospice with Fud, I said to the nurses that I couldn't understand how they could do what they do. Everyday they were there for him, no matter who was on shift the care was excellent.

"By the time he passed away, the impact they made, not just on him, but on the whole family, it was incredible."

Understandably, at first, Jo describes Fud as quite a difficult patient. "Right from the start the staff at St Mary's spoke to him on his level. Nobody minded that he was a bit grumpy, because they could see that he just hadn't come to terms with what was

happening."

In time the staff started to get through.
Slowly making progress and helping Fud
come to terms with the fact his death



"He just felt heard. Originally he couldn't accept it, but they'd watch a video with him, and have a craic with him, nothing to do with his cancer or his prognosis, just building rapport.

"Right from the start they were on his level. Really, by the time he died, he had accepted what was happening and he was in as good a place as someone going through that could be."

Immediately after Fud died, Jo started to do some fundraising for St Mary's.

Death of a loved one is one of the few reasons we wouldn't take someone on in a paid or patient facing role at the hospice. She would join the care team a

year or so later.

Initially Jo and a gang of Fud's mate's launched Fudstock — capitalising on his love of music to provide an event in his name where everyone could party.

There have been four Fudstock events over the years, and they've raised more than £75k.

Much of that money was used to upgrade the outdoor space at the Hospice which patients use. And Jo has a first hand view on what happens there — because she's now a member of the care team

Starting as a night-sitter, then becoming a health care assistant, Jo recently graduated as a Nursing Associate — which is one step removed from being a fully fledged nurse.

"When I'm in the courtyard and we're putting on an afternoon tea or a date night for a patient and their family, I look at that and I'm so proud that we've made that Fud's legacy — that space where people can enjoy the outside and still be cared for. I know he would have loved that.

And what about the career change? "I think he'd be proud of that too," admits Jo, reluctantly. "I wasn't sure about coming here, leaving a full time job for a part time role, but my husband asked where I could see myself in five years' time and I thought of Fud, and of what this place had done for us. And it was an easy decision.

"It has paid off — and I think Fud would say I've done alright."








## Café Refurbishment

The Orangery was built in 2009 as a peaceful space for patients and visitors. Its warm, welcoming atmosphere quickly became a favourite, and soon after, The Orangery café and gift shop opened its doors to the local community.



Originally built in 1988, our kitchen was designed solely to serve patient needs. Fast forward to 2025, and it's clear the space can no longer keep up with the demands of both our growing customer base and our talented kitchen team. Despite years of patchwork improvements, the kitchen is no longer efficient or fit for purpose, as it has become a vital income stream for the hospice, we're committed to its continued success.

We're thrilled to announce a major refurbishment beginning in Autumn 2025, with most of the work taking place from January 2026. Thanks to generous support from a government capital grant for hospices, the David Snowdon Trust, and the Roselands Trust, our vision is becoming a reality.

#### What's changing?

Front of house, we're doubling customer toilets, including an accessible facility with baby changing, all directly accessible from the café. A redesigned counter will offer our café team a purpose-built, well-lit space to serve up their much-loved home-baked treats.

Behind the scenes, a brand-new, open-plan kitchen will feature dedicated zones for food prep, baking, and dishwashing, improving workflow and efficiency. We're also upgrading to a walk-in fridge and freezer, alongside a separate dry store—essential for keeping pace with demand.

While some disruption is expected during the works, we're taking every step to ensure daily home-cooked meals for patients continue uninterrupted. We'll also aim to keep the café open as much as possible so you can still enjoy coffee and cake with friends.

## Why Your Support Matters More Than Ever

At St Mary's Hospice, we pride ourselves on providing compassionate, expert care completely free of charge to patients and their families. But what many people don't realise is just how much we rely on the kindness of our community to make that possible.

Despite the vital role hospices play in the healthcare system, only around 17% of our funding comes from the Government.


To put it in perspective: if we started spending our Government funding on January 1st, it would run out by mid-March.

That means eight out of every ten patients cared for by St Mary's are supported thanks to voluntary income—the generosity of people who donate, eat at the Orangery, shop with us, play our lottery, support events, or leave us gifts in their wills. It's also thanks to local businesses who back our work, fundraise, or partner with us to make a lasting impact.

This community-driven funding model has kept us going for decades, but the financial outlook is becoming increasingly challenging.

For the current financial year (2025–2026), we are forecasting a **deficit of** £560,000—and that's just to maintain our current level of care. Over the next three years, we may need to draw almost £2 million from our reserves to continue serving those who rely on us.

At the same time, we serve a population that is older than the national average.



With a 'super-ageing' community, demand for end-of-life and palliative care is only expected to grow. While we currently hold healthy reserves and remain in a stronger financial position than many other independent hospices in the UK, this level of loss is not sustainable in the long term.

That's why we're taking action on three fronts:

- Boosting charitable income by exploring new ways to raise funds and deepening our connection with loyal supporters like you.
- **Becoming more efficient** by continuously reviewing how we deliver our services to ensure maximum impact.
- Advocating for change by working with organisations like Hospice UK to call for a fairer funding model for hospice care at a national level.

Every single donation you make is spent with purpose. Every penny goes directly into patient care or into activities that generate further income for the hospice. And for every £1 we spend on fundraising, we raise at least £4.50 in return.







## Journal Club

St Mary's Hospice is proud to be taking part in a collaborative research project with Marie Curie and Lancaster University to support the development of a journal club toolkit. Using this toolkit, we have launched the St Mary's Journal Club—an educational initiative where staff come together to explore research and understand how it can enhance clinical practice.



Journal clubs are proven to support staff development, drive improvements in care, and highlight areas for further research. At St Mary's, our Journal Club meets monthly and welcomes participation from

across our multidisciplinary team. Each session includes the presentation of academic articles, research papers, media content, or relevant news stories, followed by open, respectful discussions in a safe space. All staff and volunteers are encouraged to attend, and in just our first seven sessions, over 100 team members have taken part—contributing ideas that have directly influenced positive change at the hospice.



## "When the Smile Disappears":

## Phil's Story of Love, Loss, and Finding Strength at St Mary's

There are moments in life that knock the wind out of you — times when the world shifts so suddenly, so deeply, that you're left trying to breathe through the ache. For Phil, that moment didn't happen just once.



He lost his son, Aaron, and his wife, Michelle, in a heartbreakingly short space of time. The grief was unimaginable. "Loss, lonely, and don't know where to turn to — don't know who to turn to," Phil says quietly.

Aaron couldn't speak, but his smile could fill a room. He had a way of connecting with people that didn't require words. His mischievous spirit showed through in the little things — that pouty bottom lip he'd stick out just to get a reaction. When Michelle walked in and said, "Hello sweet pea," it was gone in an instant, replaced by the brightest grin. That was Aaron — full of charm, full of love.

Music was their bond. Phil would bounce Aaron on his knee to the rhythm of Sophie Ellis-Bextor, Kylie Minogue, Girls Aloud — "All the female ones," he laughs. It wasn't just music — it was joy, shared between father and son.

Michelle, too, had her own kind of magic. A lover of books with shelves stacked three deep, she had a sense of humour that made life lighter. Phil remembers coming home to her "decorating" — not by taking the pictures off the wall, but by painting around them. "I've left that bit for you," she'd say. That was her.

Then came the silence. They were both gone. And Phil was left trying to figure out how to live in a world that had gone quiet. That's when he found St Mary's.

"St Mary's really helped me," Phil says.
"Kelsey with the massaging — that
helped me feel human again. And she
put me onto an art class with Lex. That
helped me get out and meet people
going through the same things I was.
That really helped."



At first, Phil was unsure.
"I thought, is this going to be heavy? Like — boom —

do I have to say what happened?" But it wasn't like that. "You just relax.

Sometimes people open up, and sometimes they don't. And that's okay."

He found peace in the gardening group, too. "I love the gardening group," he smiles. "We meet up, we have a brew, we talk. You don't even have to talk if you don't want to. You're just around people who get it."

Tuesdays became a lifeline — packed with purpose and connection.

"Tuesday's a big day for me," Phil explains. "Gardening group from 10 to 12. Then I've got to rush to Barrow, do a bit of shopping, then 1 to 3 is the art group. Then straight after that, I'm making brews for the chair-based exercise group, chin-wagging with everyone. I'm talking to loads of people. It's great stuff."

It's not just activity — it's reconnection. It's finding laughter again in the middle of sorrow. It's being seen, understood, and supported — not just as someone who's lost so much, but as someone who still has so much to give.

"I'd come out of myself recently," he reflects. "And people noticed. It's because I had that space. I had people around me. St Mary's gave me that."

Phil didn't go to St Mary's because he was ill. He went because his heart was broken.



What he found there was more than therapy or scheduled sessions. He found community,

dignity, and new reasons to smile.

The programme focuses on helping new team members consolidate their learning, grow in confidence, and embed the values of person-centred, dignified care that define our hospice. With guidance from our experienced nursing and education teams, participants receive support in translating theory into practice—while learning to navigate the professional codes of conduct with integrity and compassion.

We were proud to welcome three newly qualified Registered Nurses in September, all of whom have now completed the programme and become valued members of our clinical team. Currently, two newly registered Nursing Associates are actively engaged in the programme, continuing their journey with the same dedication and heart.

Our investment in initiatives like this reflects a wider commitment—not just to excellent care today, but to building a strong, skilled workforce for the future. It's another example of how St Mary's Hospice continues to grow and evolve, ensuring that we can be there for every patient, every family, every time.

## Dementia Unmuted:

## Celebrating Life, Creativity, and Connection in the Heart of Barrow

This February, Barrow came alive with music, theatre, dance, and heartfelt storytelling as St Mary's Hospice proudly hosted the Dementia Unmuted Festival—a bold, uplifting celebration of life, creativity, and community for people living with dementia and those who support them. Born from the heart of the Furness Dementia Partnership, this vibrant, coproduced festival brought together individuals, families, artists, and organisations to challenge stigma, inspire connection, and celebrate voices too often overlooked.

We are now proud to share that Dementia Unmuted has been named a finalist in the Dementia Care Awards 2025. This national recognition reflects not only the strength of our collaboration across health, social care, and the voluntary sector, but also the joy, bravery, and shared purpose of everyone who took part. From the first beat of music to the last standing ovation, this festival was powered by a collective belief: that dementia does not silence creativity, nor should it isolate those who live with it.

#### A Joyful Opening: Music and Shared Expression

The festival launched with an open mic afternoon at Barrow Cricket Club, where service users, families, and local performers filled the room with music, dance, poetry, and laughter. The atmosphere was electric, alive with movement and mutual support. For many living with dementia, music awakens memory and ignites joy—and this event was living proof.

"It was inspiring to see participants engage with and become enraptured by the singing and movement," said Sophie Murphy-Ayeche, Admiral Dementia Nurse at St Mary's Hospice. "These shared experiences reminded us all of the healing, connecting power of creativity."





Theatre That Speaks: Pluto Productions at The Forum Midway through the festival, The Forum became a stage for deeper reflection. St Mary's Hospice was proud to host Pluto Productions in presenting their moving play Where or When, an exploration of the dementia journey through powerful scenes of love, loss, and resilience.

Audience members were visibly moved, and the performance sparked meaningful conversation. Following the play, a panel of experts, carers, and community voices opened a dialogue around dementia care, lived experience, and the need for empathetic, inclusive support. Alongside, booths from local organisations offered information, storytelling, and moments of connection.

"We are so grateful to Pluto Productions, our panel members, and all the organisations that helped make this such a meaningful event," said Sophie. "The arts and shared dialogue have the power to change perceptions and bring people together in understanding."



#### **Dancing into Belonging: Strictly St Mary's**

The festival reached a joyful finale with Strictly St Mary's, a glittering afternoon of music and movement, again held at Barrow Cricket Club. Taking inspiration from the beloved TV show, and supported by Margaret Hetherington's School of Dancing, the event welcomed people of all ages and abilities to laugh, move, and dance together.

"To watch people set their worries aside for a few hours and let the music and movement take over was enchanting,"
Sophie reflected. "The smiles, the laughter—it was just magic."

Research consistently shows that dance and music can boost mood, cognitive function, and social interaction for people with dementia. Strictly St Mary's brought that research to life in the most joyous way.



#### A Festival Film and a Lasting Message

A particular highlight of the festival was the Dementia Unmuted film, featuring two inspirational gentlemen living with dementia. Their honest, moving reflections on identity, resilience, and finding purpose captured the heart of what the festival aimed to share: that life with dementia can still be rich with meaning, laughter, and love.

This festival was more than a series of events—it was a message. A celebration of ability over limitation, of expression over silence. It showed what's possible when we listen deeply, create together, and stand united in our commitment to a more compassionate, inclusive world.





As finalists in the Dementia Care Awards, we carry forward this recognition not just as an honour, but as a promise—to keep raising voices, building connections, and nurturing joy wherever we can.

## Compassionate Communities Bring Inclusive End-of-Life Conversations to Life

We're proud to share that members of the Compassionate Communities team at St Mary's Hospice are now trained facilitators of the innovative No Barriers Here programme—an arts-based, inclusive approach to advance care planning that centres the voices of those often excluded from traditional palliative care conversations.

No Barriers Here uses creative tools such as collage, textiles, and storytelling to help individuals express their end-of-life wishes in ways that feel accessible, safe, and meaningful. Whether participants face learning disabilities, cultural barriers, or communication challenges, this approach opens powerful conversations about what truly matters.

We are absolutely delighted to now be delivering No Barriers Here workshops within our local community. This work builds on our wider aim of ensuring that everyone—regardless of background or ability—has the opportunity to be heard and respected in decisions about their care.

## Building Compassion: Our Bereavement Champion Initiative

In January 2025, we proudly launched our Bereavement Champion initiative—a community-led programme created to strengthen grief support and understanding across our local area. Grief touches all of us in some way, and through this initiative, we're equipping people with the knowledge, confidence, and compassion needed to support others through loss—because grief is everyone's business.

The response so far has been incredible. Over 120 individuals have already completed our training, becoming Bereavement Champions who are now helping to foster greater empathy, awareness, and connection in their communities. Whether through quiet conversations, gentle guidance, or simply being there when it matters most, these champions are making a real difference.

This important work has been made possible thanks to the generous support of the Walney Extension Community Fund, whose funding has enabled us to deliver high-quality, accessible workshops to a wide and diverse audience.

Participant feedback has been deeply encouraging:

"I enjoyed the workshop today. It helped me gain a better understanding of bereavement and gave me more confidence in having those conversations with people. I also gained a better understanding of available services."

Looking ahead, we're thrilled to be

hosting our first Grief Festival at Barrow Town Hall on Thursday 4th December—a special event to bring our Bereavement Champions together to share stories, reconnect, and celebrate the impact they're having.



We're also preparing to launch our Train the Trainer programme, which will extend the reach of bereavement education even further by empowering a new generation of facilitators to deliver this essential training across the region.

This work is about more than just education—it's about building a compassionate community where no one has to face grief alone. With your continued support, we can keep growing this movement and ensure that kindness, understanding, and human connection remain at the heart of how we respond to loss.

about creating a space where people can focus on living well, whatever challenges they may be facing.

They make new friends, share stories, learn from each other, and often find strength and hope in unexpected places.
